Re: Walmart's Continuing False and Deceptive U.S.-Origin Marketing


Dear Mr. Kohm:

As you will recall, in July 2015 TINA.org filed a complaint with the FTC regarding false and deceptive Made in USA representations on Walmart.com, which resulted in an FTC investigation and eventual closing letter. Pursuant to that closing letter, the Commission raised concerns regarding country-of-origin claims on the Walmart website, as well as concerns relating to the clarity and conspicuousness of disclosures on "Made in USA" labels used in conjunction with Walmart's Investing in American Jobs Program.<sup>1</sup>

Now, more than five years later, the world's largest retailer<sup>2</sup> continues to violate the law. Walmart, through its American jobs initiative website portal, is still advertising products as Made in the USA when they contain imported components. Specifically, a search for "made in usa" on Walmart's website leads consumers to its "America At Work" webpage. At the top of this webpage, Walmart features a "Made In America" video, which is also aired on national television and was promoted on social media, that contains numerous unqualified U.S.-origin statements:





Beneath this video is, among other things, a link entitled "Find American-Made Products on Walmart.com" (located just above a section entitled "US Manufacturing.")




Clicking on the "Shop Now" to "Find American-Made Products on Walmart.com" brings consumers to Walmart's "Investing in American jobs" webpage,<sup>5</sup> which lists approximately 2,000 products that are – presumably – American-made.




Screenshot of "Find American-Made Products on Walmart.com" filter results on Jan. 13, 2021

However, a review of the products showcased in the "American-Made" filter reveals that many do not meet the FTC's definition of USA-made and/or fail to clearly and conspicuously disclose qualifying information. Specifically, TINA.org compiled a sampling of more than 40 products, which purportedly contain imported parts, according to hard to find origin information provided on the individual product pages, and some of which are accompanied by product specifications that confusingly state the origin of the product as "USA or Imported."


Examples of products included in Walmart's "America-Made Products" filter:

While Walmart attempts to redefine the Made in USA standard as "made, grown, or assembled in America" sporadically on its website and other marketing materials, <sup>10</sup> that definition is at odds with the Commission's "all or virtually" standard, and is drowned out by the many unqualified Made in USA claims Walmart makes elsewhere.

Walmart's history of deceptive Made in USA marketing claims on its website now spans more than five years and is exacerbated by consumers' current need/desire to shop online during the global pandemic. Obviously, as the world's largest retailer, the company's continuing failure to address these issues cannot be related to a lack of resources or sophistication. Indeed, a Walmart representative was a panelist at the Commission's 2019 Made in the USA workshop.<sup>11</sup> As such, TINA.org urges the FTC to reopen its investigation of Walmart and take appropriate enforcement action.









TINA.org's full sampling of Walmart's recent Made in USA marketing is available at <a href="https://www.truthinadvertising.org/2021-walmart-database/">https://www.truthinadvertising.org/2021-walmart-database/</a>.

For each product in the database, TINA.org compared the origin information provided by Walmart.com to origin information provided on the manufacturers' websites, to the extent origin information was available. With one exception, all of the third-party manufacturer information TINA.org could locate confirmed that the products at issue contain imported parts. The exception is Sterilite – this manufacturer's website, sterilite.com, indicates that its products are "Made in USA," which then begs the question, why does Walmart.com's specifications state that certain Sterilite products are entirely imported while others contain imported parts?





And to make matters even more troubling, certain products that come through Walmart's "made in usa" filter contain multiple, conflicting statements regarding the product's origin, leaving consumers completely confused as to the true origin of the product.

For example, on the product page for the Lasko 16" Stand 3-Speed Fan with Remote, Model 1646, White, Walmart states in the specifications section that the "Country of Origin" for both the components and the assembly is "United States," as opposed to "Imported" or "USA or Imported," as is the case for the two products that Walmart uses as comparisons. Yet, just beneath the specifications for this product, Walmart indicates the product is "Made in the USA from domestic and imported parts."

Of note, Hoover is itself engaged in deceptive Made in USA marketing as, among other things, the qualifying information that notifies consumers its products contain imported parts is not clear and conspicuous as is required by law. *See* Hoover's Made in USA Claims, <a href="https://www.truthinadvertising.org/hoovers-made-in-usa-claims/">https://www.truthinadvertising.org/hoovers-made-in-usa-claims/</a>. Hoover's parent company, Royal Appliance Mfg.
